10354 Bead Chain in a Box

When the bead chain is touched, it triggers lights, music and vibrations. It helps teach cause and effect and increases visual, auditory and tactile sensory awareness.



10342 Mystery Sensory Balls

This set of six mirror balls look identical but all do different things such as wobbling, spinning rattling or not rolling in a straight line. The surface of the balls gives a distorted fish eye reflection. The balls encourage imagination.

Letter From Client Thanks Library For Inclusivity

This letter from a client shows that the library is doing more than just being a place to hire resources; it is also acting as an inclusive community space.

Hi Charlotte

Thank you so much for your support with Mark* this morning. It's so difficult juggling Mark's needs, which are always pressing, with the wants and needs of [his siblings] who often have their outings either cut short or not happen at all as a result of Mark being "out of sorts".

There is always hindsight and I perhaps should have not come into the library and gone home instead, but sometimes Mark will come around, and it is this unpredictability which makes seemingly simple outings so stressful. I find the hardest part of going out is often the perception I have that I'm being judged as a parent for the way I manage Mark - after all he appears very "normal", his disability cannot be seen. With the support of others, I'm learning (slowly) to let go of this perception. It is people like yourself, who are so accepting and embracing of Mark for who he is, that gives me the courage to engage in our local community. The SNL is one of the few places we can go where we always feel welcome, and not judged.

Thank you so much Charlotte, you are a gift to the children and parents that you support.

For emotional and social development, the wooden lotto tiles with facial expressions on, help users to learn about feelings and identify their own and other people's emotions.



10357 Cyclone

Whipping up glittery coloured shapes and sounds of wind, rain, thunder and music encourages visual attention, reaching and sensory stimulation.



10364 Aroma Therapy Fan

The fan blows out several different fragrances at the touch of a capability switch. This encourages sense of smell and improves sensory awareness.

10343 Fresh Picked Fruit & Vege Tote



The canvas tote of fruit and vegetables encourages language development, dramatic play and social interaction including conversations about recycling and healthy food.
